GREEN BAY (1-1) at CINCINNATI (2-0)
Mon., Aug. 28 • Paul Brown Stadium • 7 p.m. CDT

THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ▶ The Packers return to Cincinnati, site of one of their strangest games in recent memory last Oct. 30, for their first 2006 national television appearance.
- ▶ It's the first of four 2006 games in which the Packers are guaranteed to play on national television. Two of the others also are ESPN *Monday Night Football* contests, at Philadelphia (Oct. 2) and at Seattle (Nov. 27). The fourth is a Thursday night affair on the NFL Network, vs. Minnesota (Dec. 21). In addition, NBC could select the Packers to play on a Sunday night during the last half of the season, with the league's new flexible scheduling option.
- ▶ RB Ahman Green (quadriceps) and LB Brady Poppinga are expected to play in their first game since injuries ended their respective 2005 seasons. In addition, unrestricted free agent S Marquand Manuel (calf) is expected to make his unofficial Packers debut.
- ▶ Projected regular-season starters are expected to see their most action of the preseason, customary for Week 3.
- ▶ The Packers have seven days in between preseason Games 2-3, before concluding the preseason on just three days "rest" vs. Tennessee (Sept. 1).
- ▶ Following the contest, the Packers need to make their first roster reduction, to 75 players (by 3 p.m. CDT Aug. 29). All exemptions also expire on the first date, unlike previous years.

NATIONAL TELEVISION: *Monday Night Football*, the most successful series in sports television history, moves to **ESPN** under an eight-year agreement between the network and the NFL starting this season.

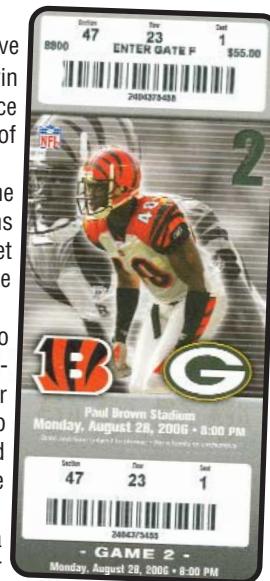
- ▶ The network's new broadcast crew, anchored by play-by-play man **Mike Tirico**, includes analysts **Joe Theismann** and **Tony Kornheiser**, sideline reporters **Suzu Kolber** and **Michele Tafoya**, producer **Jay Rothman** and director **Chip Dean** in the truck, along with statistician **Alex Stern** from Elias Sports Bureau.
- ▶ The contest also will air as a simulcast locally on **WBAY** (Ch. 2) in Green Bay and **WISN** (Ch. 12) in Milwaukee.
- ▶ What's more, **ESPN International** will air the contest in three languages to over 180 countries.
- ▶ The new agreement calls for 17 regular-season Monday night games per season on ESPN — featuring a new 7:30 p.m. CT telecast time (7:40 p.m. kickoff) — plus four preseason contests.

PACKERS RADIO: Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 57-station Packers Radio Network, with versatile **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color). Spanning five states, the network covers 47 markets in six states throughout the upper Midwest. The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on packers.com.



ROSTER MOVES: The Packers today have released punter B.J. Sander and linebacker Kevin Schimmelmann. Ted Thompson, Executive Vice President, General Manager and Director of Football Operations, announced the moves.

- ▶ The release of Sander, the incumbent in the Packers' training-camp battle at punter, means that former CFL punter Jon Ryan should get the most reps over the final two weeks of the preseason.
- ▶ Sander, a 6-4, 218-pound veteran from Ohio State, was the Packers' third of three selections in the third round of the 2004 draft after winning the Ray Guy award as the nation's top collegiate punter. Last season, he averaged 39.2 gross yards on 64 punts, with 11 inside the 20 and two touchbacks.
- ▶ Ryan was signed by Green Bay as a reserve/future free agent, Feb. 1, 2006, after two years with the CFL's Winnipeg Blue Bombers. In 2005, he set a single-season CFL record with a 50.6-yard gross punting average and also posted the CFL's longest 2005 punt (80 yards). In 2004 with Winnipeg, he averaged 43.2 yards per punt and had one kick of 92 yards. Ryan is a native of Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada.
- ▶ The Packers released veteran kicker Billy Cundiff Thursday.

- ▶ Today, after the 2 p.m. practice, will be the last of 12 autograph sessions in the new area, a successful replacement for the formal autograph tables used in previous years.
- ▶ "We think it has worked well, providing an opportunity for kids to see the players up close," said General Manager Ted Thompson, who came up with the idea. "Our hope was to allow more kids to experience that interaction than had been able to in the past, and judging by the strong turnout day after day, I think we accomplished that."
- ▶ Thompson added that pending a review of training camp policies and procedures, the area may be continued in future seasons and could become a new training camp tradition of its own.
- ▶ The "Future Lambeau Leapers" area is located on the south side of the Oneida Nation Gate at Lambeau Field, and eight to 10 players appear in the area for 20-30 minutes following various practices. It is limited to children ages 12 and under, and no tokens or tickets are needed.
- ▶ The more traditional opportunities to interact with the players, such as when they are walking to and from practice, entering and exiting the practice field, and mingling near the bike corral at the facility entrance, are still available to fans through Saturday, Aug. 26, the last of the practices that are open to the public. The team has closed both practices Tuesday, however.

PRIMED FOR PRIME TIME: Green Bay's three scheduled prime-time appearances during the regular season are on ESPN's *Monday Night Football* (Oct. 2 at Philadelphia and Nov. 27 at Seattle) and on the NFL Network's Thursday night series (Dec. 21 vs. Minnesota).

- ▶ All three ESPN appearances are on the road.
- ▶ The 2006 slate features the Packers' first Thursday night contest in eight years. Green Bay hosts Minnesota Dec. 21 as part of the NFL Network's new late-season package. The night will mark the latest in the year the NFL has ever scheduled a prime-time game in Wisconsin (previously Sunday night, Dec. 11, 2005, vs. Detroit).
- ▶ The Packers held a 12-5 mark on the combined ESPN/TNT Sunday prime-time series (10-3 on ESPN, 2-2 on TNT).
- ▶ Green Bay holds one of the league's best Sunday night records, 12-2.
- ▶ On Thursday night, the Packers are 0-3.

- ON MONDAY NIGHT:** On *Monday Night Football* for a 14th consecutive season, the Packers make two more regular-season appearances in 2006.
- ▶ The Packers own the NFC's longest *MNF* appearance streak — 14 seasons (1993-2006). Minnesota (15, 1987-2001) and Dallas (11, 1991-2001) both ended long stretches in 2002. Miami (15, 1990-2004) saw its streak end in '05. In the NFL, only Denver (15, 1992-2006) now has a longer streak.
 - ▶ Prior to the Packers' current 14-year string of playing on at least one Monday night, Green Bay didn't appear for six straight years, 1986-92.
 - ▶ Brett Favre is 17-13 in 30 Monday night starts (1993-2005). He was 6-1 during his three consecutive MVP seasons, 1995-97.
 - ▶ Favre and Robert Brooks own the *MNF* record for longest pass completion, a 99-yard touchdown strike at Chicago, Sept. 11, 1995 (Packers franchise record, tied NFL record).
 - ▶ The Packers are 24-23-1 in the regular season on *MNF*.
 - ▶ During a memorable Oct. 17, 1983, Redskins-Packers game, still the highest scoring game in *MNF* history — Green Bay won a 48-47 track meet. Facing the defending Super Bowl champions, the Packers prevailed in a contest featuring 11 touchdowns, 11 extra points and six field goals. Jan Stenerud's 20-yard FG with 54 seconds left decided the issue. The 'Skins' Mark Moseley missed a 39-yard try as time expired. The contest also represented the highest scoring game in the Packers' history, surpassing Green Bay's 52-35 loss at Detroit in 1951.
 - ▶ Debuting in 1970, *Monday Night Football* has been a landmark series in the history of American television, spending its first 36 seasons on ABC.

ON ESPN: ESPN had aired *Sunday Night Football*, the highest-rated series on ad-supported cable television, every year since its 1987 launch. *Monday Night Football* concluded a 36-year run on ABC in 2005.

- ▶ ESPN first televised Sunday primetime NFL games in 1987, covering the second half of the regular season (eight games annually 1987 – 89, nine games 1990 – 1997), and has carried a full slate of 18 games since 1998.
- ▶ ESPN's Emmy Award-winning *Sunday NFL Countdown* pregame show will return. *Monday Night Countdown*, an ESPN pregame show chronicling Sunday's action and previewing the Monday night game, also will return and will be aired live from the site of each Monday night game beginning in 2006. *Monday Night Countdown* will be the centerpiece of a companywide effort to make *Monday Night Football* a "traveling road show" in each city it visits.
- ▶ The Packers are 10-4 all-time during the regular-season on ESPN:

FIVE IN THE FIRST 75: The Packers this past April used several trades to increase their draft class from seven to 12 overall selections, and wound up with the most draft choices in the NFL.

- ▶ Included in that group of 12 were five Day 1 choices in the fertile ground from selections 1-75 — LB A.J. Hawk (5), G/T Daryn Colledge (47), WR Greg Jennings (52), LB Abdul Hodge (67) and G/C Jason Spitz (75).
- ▶ Since 1993, when the league reduced the draft from 12 rounds to seven, only four previous teams have had as many picks in the first 75 selections:

Mike McCarthy: 0-0, first NFL season

MIKE McCARTHY...Is in his first year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ One of those previous 13 years was with the Packers, as quarterbacks coach in 1999.
- ▶ Spent the past six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- ▶ Has never been a head coach at any level, having begun his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

MARVIN LEWIS...Is in his fourth year as the Bengals' ninth head coach.

- ▶ In 2005, the Bengals reached the playoffs for the first time since 1990, going 11-5 and losing in the AFC Wild Card Game to eventual Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh.
- ▶ In 2003, the Bengals were the NFL's most improved team (six-game increase), and Lewis finished second in Associated Press voting for NFL Coach of the Year while also being named Rookie Coach of the Year by Football Digest.
- ▶ Prior to his arrival, Lewis directed the NFL's fifth-ranked defensive unit with the Washington Redskins (2002).
- ▶ He spent six seasons (1996-2001) as defensive coordinator with the Baltimore Ravens, a tenure that included a Super Bowl victory following the 2000 season. In the 2000 regular season, Lewis' Baltimore defense set the NFL record for fewest points allowed in a 16-game campaign (165). Prior to joining Baltimore, he spent four seasons (1992-95) with Pittsburgh as linebackers coach.

THE PACKERS-BENGALS SERIES: These clubs have met 10 times, splitting the contests.

- ▶ Prior to last year, the Packers owned a three-game winning streak in the series (24-23 in 1992 and 24-10 in 1995, both in Green Bay, and 13-6 in 1998 at Cincinnati). That 1998 meeting is the Packers' lone win in Cincinnati in franchise history.
- ▶ The series launched at Lambeau Field in 1971, when the legendary Paul Brown was head coach of the Bengals, a team he had founded three years earlier as a member of the then American Football League. The Packers got off to a winning start in the rivalry, posting a 20-17 victory in their first meeting, with a Lou Michaels field goal providing the victory margin.
- ▶ Perhaps the most memorable game in the series came in 1992 when Brett Favre, summoned to replace an injured Don Majkowski at quar-

terback in the first period, proceeded to direct the Packers to an electrifying, 24-23 come-from-behind victory, forged when he hit wide receiver Kitrick Taylor with a 35-yard scoring pass as only 13 seconds remained in the game. Chris Jacke's subsequent conversion settled the issue.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS: Lewis and McCarthy were both assistant coaches at the University of Pittsburgh in 1990 and 1991...Bengals LB Hannibal Navies played two seasons with the Packers, in 2003 and 2004...Another LB, Marcus Wilkins, originally signed as a rookie free agent with Green Bay in 2002 and played his first two seasons with the Packers...Ohio State products include LB A.J. Hawk (Centerville High School), DE/DT Kenny Peterson (Canton McKinley High School), and DT Ryan Pickett ...FB William Henderson (Green Bay) and RB Rudi Johnson (Cincinnati) are cousins...Packers RB Arliss Beach is from nearby Ashland, Ky. ...New Green Bay CB Antonio Malone is from Portsmouth, Ohio, just miles from Ashland...Bengals WR Antonio Chatman played the last three seasons for the Packers...Bengals WR Reggie McNeal and Packers DT Johnny Jolly were teammates at Texas A&M and were both drafted in the sixth round in April 2006...Packers LB Roy Manning and Bengals RB Chris Perry were teammates at Michigan...Bengals defensive line coach Jay Hayes was an assistant coach at Wisconsin from 1995-98...Packers public relations coordinator Sarah Quick is a native of Middletown, Ohio, and graduated from Ursuline Academy...Cincinnati S Kevin Kaesviharn also originally signed as a rookie free agent with Green Bay, in 2001, and returned an INT that year for a touchdown in the Family Night scrimmage.

INDIVIDUALLY VS. CINCINNATI: In last year's game at Cincinnati, three Packers defenders set their career highs in various categories -- linebacker Nick Barnett with 15 solo tackles, defensive tackle Colin Cole with seven total tackles, safety Nick Collins with three passes defended. Also in that game, tight end Bubba Franks tied his career-high with 62 receiving yards (on seven receptions)...Favre has 1,181 career passing yards in four career games against the Bengals, his most against an AFC opponent.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON: Oct. 25, 2005, Paul Brown Stadium, Bengals won, 21-14.

- ▶ In one of the strangest endings to any game, the Packers drove from deep in their own territory in the final minute with the help of a 48-yard pass interference penalty. Going without a huddle against a reeling defense, the Packers had a play blown dead from the Bengals' 28 when a fan jumped out of the stands and ran onto the field. The man grabbed the ball out of Favre's hand and eluded security, which needed several minutes to tackle and arrest him. The long delay broke the Packers' momentum, Favre was sacked on the next play and then threw a desperation pass from beyond the line of scrimmage on the final snap.
- ▶ Favre passed John Elway for second all-time in passing attempts and passing yards but threw a regular-season high five interceptions. His touchdown pass to Bubba Franks, following an Ahmad Carroll interception and 88-yard drive, pulled the Packers within a touchdown with 3:11 left in the fourth quarter.
- ▶ Odell Thurman's second interception, off a tip by Deltha O'Neal, came one play before Carson Palmer's 27-yard TD pass to Jeremi Johnson, giving the Bengals a 21-7 lead. Palmer threw for three TDs on the day.

LAST MEETING, PRESEASON: Aug. 24, 1991, Milwaukee County Stadium, Bengals won, 19-16 (OT).

- ▶ Jim Breech kicked a game-saving, 31-yard field goal with three seconds in regulation, then connected on a 43-yard game-winner in OT.
- ▶ The Packers built a 13-0 lead on a pair of Brad Daluiso field goals and Sterling Sharpe's 25-yard TD reception from Don Majkowski.



THIS WEEK — at CINCINNATI

FIRST ROSTER REDUCTION ON TAP: Following this week's game, the Packers will be required by league mandate to reduce their roster.

- ▶ By 3 p.m. CDT Tuesday, Aug. 29, the Packers can carry no more than 75 active players.
- ▶ Green Bay has 10 players designated as roster exemptions, but unlike previous years when those exemptions carried through to the final cut, in 2006 they expire at the first reduction date, Aug. 29.
- ▶ Other important roster dates are Friday, Sept. 2 (final reduction, to 53 players, by 3 p.m. CDT), and Saturday, Sept. 3 (practice squad established, after 11 a.m. CDT).

THE PITT PIPELINE: Marvin Lewis and Mike McCarthy were both assistant coaches on Paul Hackett's University of Pittsburgh staff from 1990-91.

- ▶ Lewis, the Panthers' outside linebackers coach, already was on his fourth coaching job, after successfully launching his career at Idaho State, Long Beach State and New Mexico. After 1991, Lewis moved to the NFL but didn't go far, shifting from Pitt to the Pittsburgh Steelers.
- ▶ McCarthy was a graduate assistant for Hackett, working with the quarterbacks.
- ▶ Jon Gruden, now Tampa Bay's head coach, also served on that '91 staff, as wide receivers coach (his lone season at Pitt).
- ▶ In fact, when Gruden left Pitt to become the Green Bay Packers' wide receivers coach after that '91 season, McCarthy replaced him as Pitt's wide receivers coach — McCarthy's first full-time post.

WELCOME TO THE 21ST CENTURY: For the first time since 1969, the Packers last season did not play a regular-season game on "AstroTurf" — the surface that covered Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field for several decades.

- ▶ In 2005, Green Bay still played five games on fake grass, but they were all on softer, more realistic surfaces (at Atlanta, Baltimore, Cincinnati, Detroit and Minnesota). FieldTurf, the same surface that covers two of the Packers' three practice fields, is the home surface for the Bengals, Falcons, Lions and Vikings. Baltimore plays on a different brand, "Sportexe Momentum."
- ▶ Green Bay played its first game on the hard, abrasive AstroTurf Dec. 6, 1970, a 20-12 win over the pre-dynasty Pittsburgh Steelers at Three Rivers Stadium.
- ▶ Brett Favre and the Packers are 5-4 all-time on FieldTurf (since 2002): 2-2 at Ford Field, 1-0 at Memorial Stadium in Champaign, Ill., 1-1 at the Metrodome, 0-1 at Paul Brown Stadium, and 1-0 at the Georgia Dome. They're 0-1 on the "Sportexe Momentum," the Ravens' home turf.
- ▶ During the 2006 regular season, Green Bay plays on 21st century synthetic surfaces four times: at Detroit (FieldTurf), Buffalo (AstroPlay), Minnesota (FieldTurf) and Seattle (FieldTurf).

LAST WEEK — vs. ATLANTA

IMPROVED, TEAM EFFORT FUELS PACKERS: There's an old adage that you have to crawl before you can walk and the 2006 edition of the Green Bay Packers might just be the perfect example of that theory.

- ▶ There were plenty of highlights to go around, but perhaps the most impressive feat of the night belonged to a first-team offense that seemingly fired on all cylinders in the Green Bay Packers 38-10 victory over the Atlanta Falcons Saturday at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ In only their second game of the Mike McCarthy era, the Green and Gold showed considerable improvement from last week's 17-3 loss to the San Diego Chargers.

- ▶ Not surprisingly, Brett Favre led the charge, completing 16 of his 22 passes for 134 yards and two touchdowns in an impressive showing by the home team. Of course, No. 4 had help and it all started up front with a revamped offensive line that featured new right guard Tony Moll, a fifth-round selection out of Nevada. Also to no one's surprise, Donald Driver continued to be Favre's go-to guy, hauling in six catches for 75 yards. The eighth-year pro was at his finest on the Packers' most impressive scoring drive of the evening (13 plays, 70 yards, 7 minutes time of possession) when he caught three Favre passes for 41 yards.
- ▶ Favre, entering his 16th season, admitted that even for an old pro like him, it's comforting to see improvement from game to game, even if it is only the preseason.
- ▶ The rushing attack was up and down, but backup Arliss Beach, an undrafted free agent out of Kentucky, acquitted himself rather nicely. The 5-10, 219-pound back finished with 50 yards on nine carries, including a nifty 19-yard run.
- ▶ The emergence of rookie Greg Jennings also gave the Packers' offense a boost, particularly in the second half. But then again, the wide receiver drafted in the second round out of Western Michigan has been turning heads throughout training camp.
- ▶ This time, instead of Favre at the helm, it was Aaron Rodgers who hit Jennings on a slant pattern that he turned into an 85-yard touchdown. All told, Jennings had 131 yards on four receptions and Rodgers, despite only attempting three passes, finished with two touchdowns, the other going to tight end Zac Alcorn in the fourth quarter.
- ▶ While the offense clearly shined, the defense was no slouch either. In fact, the defensive unit produced nearly as many spectacular plays as the offense, including a 44-yard interception return for a touchdown by cornerback Jason Horton to give the Packers a 24-10, second-quarter lead. Horton, who missed part of the 2005 season with a shoulder injury, made a great play on a tipped ball and raced down the sideline high-stepping into the end zone on what turned out to be the first of three takeaways for the Packers defense.
- ▶ Aaron Kampman, who has been a mainstay on the Packers defense, was pleased with the unit's ability to bounce back from the San Diego game.
- ▶ "I just think we came out and hit them in the mouth a little more than we did against the Chargers. It was more of a team effort."
- ▶ A team effort might just be the best way to sum up the Packers' night. Three interceptions by the defense (rookies Tyrone Culver and Johnny Jolly had the others) and four touchdown passes by the offense made for quite a performance in front of a Lambeau Field crowd of 69,845.



NOTEBOOK — MOLL MAKES MOST OF CHANCE: Because it's all happened so fast for Tony Moll, you almost couldn't blame the rookie offensive lineman if he would have had trouble stepping into the Packers' starting lineup on Saturday night.

- ▶ However, as it turns out, the 6-5, 308-pound guard appeared to hold his own in his first start as a professional.
- ▶ Head Coach Mike McCarthy said he would reserve judgment on Moll and the rest of the offensive line until he viewed the game film, but he stressed that the proper mindset has to be established first and foremost.
- ▶ "No. 1, it's a style of play," McCarthy said. "You have to play this game a certain way week in and week out. It looked to me from the sideline that we accomplished that. And we'll confirm that from the film study. I think we definitely moved in the right direction. That's where it all starts. It all starts up front."
- ▶ Moll, who played tight end until moving to tackle his senior year at Nevada, said it's all about taking advantage of his promotion to the first



team, regardless of how long he stays there.

- ▶ "Right now they are just trying to find the five guys that can make it happen," he said. "Either way, you just have to look at this as something positive. Hopefully I showed this team that I should stick around after the last preseason game. That's all I'm looking forward to."
- ▶ Early indications are that Moll played well and if the film confirms that, perhaps the Packers found their starting right guard.

RAYNER SOLID IN FIRST SOLO OUTING: Much like Tony Moll, another player who took a step forward in Saturday's exhibition game was kicker Dave Rayner.

- ▶ With Thursday's release of Billy Cundiff, Rayner must now prove he's the man for the job and without question he passed the first test. The second-year player out of Michigan State connected on his only field-goal attempt, a 30-yarder in the second quarter and also added five extra points.
- ▶ But perhaps his most impressive accomplishment wasn't something that shows up in a box score, and that's the distance of his kickoffs. Though he only notched one touchback for the evening, six of Rayner's seven kicks were sent to the end zone, which allowed the coverage units time to get down the field and make a play on the returner.
- ▶ It was this type of leg strength that endeared Rayner to the Packers in the first place and McCarthy admitted he likes what he sees so far in his young kicker.
- ▶ "He had an opportunity tonight and it looked like he took full advantage of it," McCarthy said. "He's a young guy, he was given a great opportunity and he performed. I know he feels good about it, and we feel good about it right now, too."

JENNINGS CONTINUES TO CATCH ON: It's no secret that Donald Driver is Brett Favre's favorite target, but it's becoming increasingly clear that Greg Jennings is a vital cog in the Packers' engine, too.

- ▶ The rookie wide receiver out of Central Michigan has earned his keep in training camp, flashing big play ability on a consistent basis and that production has transferred over to game action as well.
- ▶ At 5-11 and 197 pounds, Jennings isn't huge by any means, but that hasn't stopped him from making the big play. In the fourth quarter, he caught a quick slant from Aaron Rodgers and took it for an 85-yard score, which gave the Packers a 31-10 lead. Though the game's outcome was already decided, it didn't matter to Jennings. According to him, it's his job to contribute in all facets of the game.
- ▶ "I'm here to make this team better and help this team win, whether it's on special teams or it's on offense," Jennings explained. "But we have a great receiving corps, we have a great leader on our receiving corps with Driver, and we're supporting each other, helping each other get better."
- ▶ And although the youngster is making plays and catching the limelight all at the same time, don't be confused. He knows the relationship that

Favre and Driver have, as does the rest of the NFL. Jennings only wants to lessen the burden on those two, particularly on the team's No. 1 receiver.

- ▶ "We know we have to take the pressure off him," Jennings said. "We know he's the marquee player right now and he's going to be. It's our job to take that pressure off him so he and Brett can do what they do. And we saw what they can do tonight. It's a beautiful sight to see when they do that."
- ▶ Coming from someone who practices against him everyday, Charles Woodson also likes what he sees so far out of Jennings.
- ▶ "Some people are just natural at it," Woodson said. "You don't have to tell him a whole lot, he's just one of those guys that goes out there and plays football."
- ▶ McCarthy also likes what he sees from the rookie at this point.
- ▶ "He's a young guy that's hit his stride kind of early and I don't think that's common in our league," McCarthy said. "We're very excited about Greg and he's done everything we asked. He's only getting better."

LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE GOAL OF MCCARTHY, PACKERS: This may be Mike McCarthy's first year as a head coach, but it's not his first season in Green Bay and he knows just how important it is to establish home-field advantage, especially when that home venue just happens to be Lambeau Field.

- ▶ And though it may only have been a preseason game, McCarthy and his squad knew it wasn't too soon to regain that feeling on Saturday night.
- ▶ "We refer to it as the Lambeau advantage," McCarthy said. "And that's something that we have to take full advantage of. In years prior, it was a big plus here. You didn't want to come in here and play. We need to establish that and that was one of our goals here tonight. We wanted to get out there and play a physical football game, generate a home-field advantage. And I think our players really took advantage of that. I was very pleased with our enthusiasm and the physicality we played with tonight. And obviously, our productivity was where it needed to be."
- ▶ Without question, a 38-10 victory over a quality team such as the Falcons is a good start in regaining that advantage.
- ▶ "It's important that we had a showing like that, especially trying to get that Lambeau advantage back and give our fans a good showing," linebacker Nick Barnett said. "It was fun to go out there and win a game, especially at Lambeau."

STAT CORRECTION: The Packers' press box mistakenly gave a reception Saturday night vs. Atlanta to Donald Driver. The second-quarter play, for 16 yards, should've gone to rookie Greg Jennings.

- ▶ On the game, Driver should have been listed as having six catches for 75 yards (12.5 avg., 16 long, 0 TD). Jennings' line should've read four catches for 131 yards (32.8 avg., 85t long, 1 TD).

TRAINING CAMP NOTES

OPTIMISM FROM PARITY: Rick Gosselin of the *Dallas Morning News* points out that each year since the NFL expanded from six to eight divisions in 2003, three franchises have answered a last-place finish with a playoff berth.

- ▶ So, if history repeats itself, three of the following last-place clubs will see the postseason in 2006: Cleveland, Green Bay, Houston, New Orleans, Oakland, Philadelphia, San Francisco and the New York Jets.

THE '1-2-1' FORMAT: The Packers have joined a growing trend of NFL teams who have shifted to a "1-2-1" training camp practice format. Traditional "two-a-days" are a thing of the past. In an effort to prepare for the regular season more efficiently, Green Bay in general is practicing twice one day and once the next. On days when the team practices twice, the first session takes place at 9 a.m. and the second at 6:30 p.m., finishing under



the lights. In between, the club breaks down film of the morning practice. Then, on the following day, the Packers report in the morning to evaluate the previous night's practice, hit the field at 2 p.m., and return to the film room that night.

► Len Pasquarelli of ESPN.com surveyed NFL teams and determined that more than two-thirds of the league employs a similar camp format.

CONGRATULATIONS, REGGIE: The Packers were truly fortunate to have another former player inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame Aug. 5 in Canton, Ohio.

► The team sent a contingent to Canton to celebrate the induction. The group, consisting of several front-office executives, football operations staff, Executive Committee members, quarterback Brett Favre and long-snapper Rob Davis, departed Green Bay very early Aug. 5 and arrived in Canton at approximately 9:30 a.m. EDT. The Packers hosted a private brunch, where the traveling party was able to spend quality time with White's family, including his wife, Sara, and children, Jeremy and Jecolia. At Sara's request, just prior to the family's departure, Favre posed for a picture with Jeremy. Former general manager Ron Wolf and several of White's former teammates, including Sean Jones, Bruce Wilkerson and Santana Dotson, also were present at the brunch.

► Unfortunately, the contingent needed to depart before Sara's acceptance speech because the group felt an obligation to return to Green Bay, where the team was hosting its annual Family Night intra-squad scrimmage, which again sold every available seat in Lambeau Field. The team didn't want to disappoint the 62,701 fans, many of whom were children. The White family knew the early departure was a possibility.

► The Packers' group, which included parts of its medical and equipment staffs, attempted to stay for as long as it could, and was disappointed it could not be present for the induction.

► However, the Packers felt fortunate that they could have a presence in both Canton and Green Bay, despite the logistical challenges.

► White's induction comes just three years after James Lofton, now the Chargers' receivers coach, entered the Hall of Fame.

THEY'RE NOT OUT TO FINISH .500: Granted, expectations in Green Bay are the lowest they've been since Brett Favre's first year in a Packers uniform, 1992. That marked the training camp when the Packers were coming off their last losing season prior to 2005 — after they finished 4-12 in 1991.

► But don't expect the Packers to accept losing. They didn't last year with Favre at quarterback and they won't this year either, under Mike McCarthy.

► "In this league," McCarthy said, "you see big turnarounds happen year after year. I would not ever be comfortable standing in front of a group of men and tell them to go 8-8. That's not in my nature, and I don't think that's the way we approach this business. If we play a certain way, there's no reason why we can't win a lot of football games."

THE TRADITION CONTINUES: The Packers are conducting their 61st organized training camp. In 1946, Curly Lambeau began preseason practices at Rockwood Lodge in northeast Green Bay.

► Affable Scooter McLean spent one year as the Packers' head coach, 1958, and Green Bay went 1-10-1, the NFL's worst record (ironically, six future Hall of Famers were already in place, one year before Vince Lombardi arrived in 1959).

► McLean's legacy, however, lives with the team every summer, because he started that ill-fated '58 season with the team's first training camp at St. Norbert College. The private school, in nearby De Pere, Wis., doesn't host any on-field activities, but it does serve as the team base for living arrangements (the Packers use their regular practice, meeting and locker-room facilities on the Lambeau Field campus). The Packers haven't dramatically changed their preseason logistics in nearly 50 years.

ROOKIE HEAD COACHES IN ONE DIVISION: The NFC North features three first-time NFL head coaches in 2006: Minnesota's Brad Childress, Detroit's Rod Marinelli and McCarthy.

► According to Elias Sports Bureau, over the period since the 1970 league merger, this marks the first instance that three rookie head coaches have occupied the same division at the start of a season.

► The last time there were three rookie head coaches in a division at any point in a season was 2000, when Dallas' Dave Campo, Arizona's Dave McGinnis and Washington's Terry Robiskie battled in the NFC East.

NOT YOUR TYPICAL 4-12 TEAM: Last season, the Packers sustained their first losing record since 1991, snapping the NFL's longest streak of .500-or-better seasons. But looking beyond the record:

► The Packers sustained five losses by three points or less, most in the league ahead of San Diego and Atlanta (four each).

► The Packers outgained opponents in 12 of their 16 games, and entered the season's final month having actually scored more points than opponents. For most of the year, the Packers could hang their hat on the fact that no team had blown them out, and that they had a legitimate opportunity to win every game, including a 17-3 loss at Detroit, Sept. 11, when a penalty nullified Javon Walker's potential game-turning 55-yard reception. The 2005 Packers also were the first team in NFL history to:

► Score more points than opponents through 11 games with no more than two wins (Green Bay opened 2-9 but outscored the other team 232-223) and...

► Score as many points as opponents through 13 games with no more than three wins; the Packers were 3-10 but had matched opponents in scoring, 255-255.

► Plus, on only four occasions — Sept. 11 at Detroit, Sept. 25 vs. Tampa Bay, Nov. 21 vs. Minnesota and Dec. 19 at Baltimore — opponents put up more total offense than the Packers.

► Green Bay's 2005 slate included both Super Bowl finalists (Pittsburgh and Seattle), half of the eight division champions (Seattle, Cincinnati, Chicago and Tampa Bay), and five playoff teams (Cincinnati, Chicago, Tampa Bay, Carolina and Seattle).

► The Packers also faced each of the NFL's top five defenses (Tampa Bay, Chicago, Carolina, Pittsburgh and Baltimore, in order of final ranking).

► All told, the cumulative record of Green Bay's 2005 opponents was 136-120-0 (.531), the toughest schedule in the Brett Favre era (1992-2005).

► And, according to Elias Sports Bureau, among teams that finished with four or fewer wins in NFL annals, the Packers were among the top all-around teams on paper:

...AND TO THAT 4-12 TEAM: Green Bay made several personnel moves, notably:

- ▶ Adding five unrestricted free agents, most signed by a Packers team since before the 1998 season.
- ▶ Upgrading the league's No. 7 defense (No. 1 against the pass), Green Bay brought in unrestricted free agents Marquand Manuel, Seattle's starting safety in Super Bowl XL, DT Ryan Pickett, who led all NFL defensive linemen with 115 tackles last year, and CB Charles Woodson, a four-time Pro Bowler and potential two-way threat. Plus, the Packers resigned potential unrestricted free agent Aaron Kampman, who enjoyed his best career season in 2005.
- ▶ Drafting 12 players, most in the NFL. Up to one-third of that talented class — A.J. Hawk (LB), Daryn Colledge (G), Greg Jennings (WR) and Jason Spitz (G) — could conceivably start early in 2006.
